It's that time of the year; the garden is bursting with beautiful flowers and

delectable vegetables. As the summer winds down, fall is just around the corner.

Before we know it, frost will be here, and the show is suddenly over. Or is it?

Did you know that you can keep your vegetable garden going into October and even November? Here are a few tips to help you:

<u>Plant fall crops of you favorite cool season varieties</u>. Broccoli, kale, peas,

spinach, cabbage, and lettuce do very well in the cool autumn temperatures. We will have many of these vegetable starts ready for you soon.

<u>Pay attention to weather forecasts</u>. Average first frost in our area (according to The Old Farmers Almanac) is September 23<sup>rd</sup>. Be ready to cover your plants if it is

going to frost or freeze. An old sheet or frost blankets are fine for a frost, but heavier protection will be necessary if it's going to freeze. Dig out those old blankets and comforters for protection. Be sure to cover at night to keep the plants as warm as possible.

Help your tomatoes ripen by stressing out the plant. This forces the tomato plant to think it is going to die and it must reproduce before it does. Reduce water, pinch off all flowers, pick small fruit (to give larger fruit more energy), give the plant a good trim.

Mulch root crops to extend the harvest well into the winter. Later in the fall, put a 10-12" layer of mulch over the top of your root crops to keep the ground from freezing. You can go out anytime to dig up some fresh vegetables. Fresh carrots with Christmas dinner, anyone?

Express your individuality by listening to the plant that is calling your name, not just following what's trending on social media. There are so many reasons to be attracted to a plant, its shape, color, texture, growth pattern, aroma, flowers and the list goes on!

It is the season to keep your eye on the forecast. Make sure to bring in any houseplants that are vacationing outside for the summer before the night gets below 55 degrees. Inspect all the leaves and soil to makes sure you are not bringing in any bugs. Spray plants with neem oil to make sure no bugs come in. Trim back any plants that need to be tidied. Re-pot any plants that look rootbound. Clean/ shower any dusty plants. Now be careful with watering. Overwatering is one of the most common mistakes, and it is easy to do come fall. With shorter days, plants get less light and grow more slowly, using less water. Most plants prefer the top inch of soil to feel dry to the touch before watering.

It is a great time of year to add something new to your houseplant collection. Here at *The Flower Bin*, we are always working on improving our selection and keeping it exciting for everyone! So come on in today and see what is calling your name!

- \*Take these steps to prepare your lawn for fall and winter.
- \*Fall is a great time to seed your lawn. We carry locally-grown grass seed and we'll help you select the right seed for your lawn.
  - I. Apply **Natural Guard HuMic,** a granular humate which will improve your lawn's soil structure and increase nutrient uptake.
  - II. use *Revive* to encourage strong root development and optimize water usage;
  - III. Around Halloween, apply *ferti-lome Winterizer* fertilizer. Doing these things will help your lawn survive the winter and be ready to green-up quickly in the spring.
- \*Test your soil. Our do-it-yourself kits that will let you test soil pH and nutrient levels quickly and conveniently. Bring us the results and we can help you decide what to do.
- \*Adding organic material to your tomato and vegetable beds is something you need to do every fall. We have locally-produced, bagged soil amendments in stock for your convenience.
