Death Spiral Pepper – 1,300,000 Scovilles. 2" wrinkly yellow fruit.

7 Pot Lava Yellow – 1,800,000 Scovilles. Ripens green to peach to red.

Dragon's Breath Pepper – unofficially rated at 2,480,000 Scovilles. Tiny red scorching hot fruits. Happy spring!
