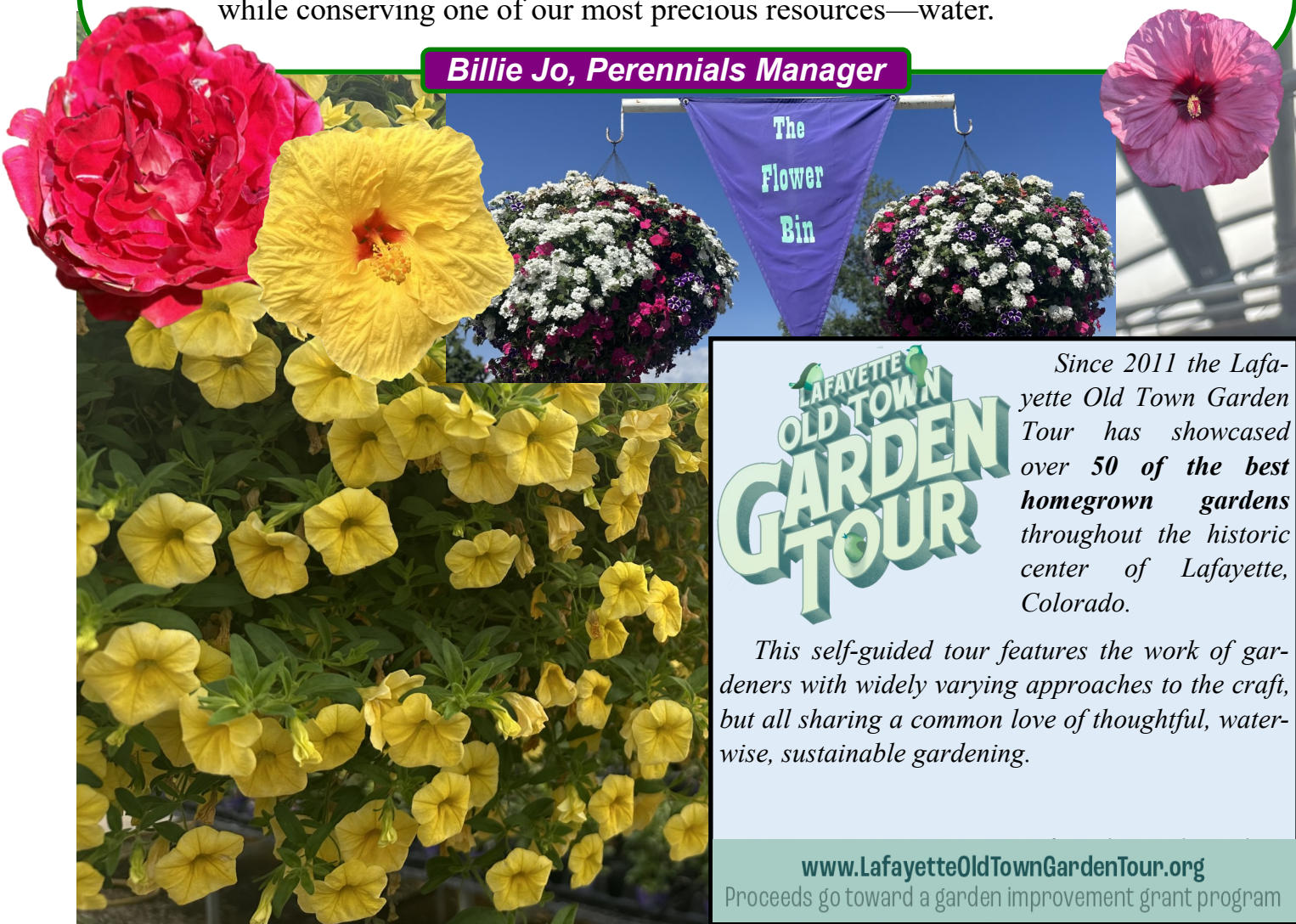

As a Colorado gardener, I've learned that success often depends on choosing plants that can handle our dry climate, intense sunshine, and unpredictable weather. With water conservation becoming increasingly important, drought-tolerant plants offer both beauty and practicality. Many of the best performers in my garden come from the Plant Select® program and native Colorado species that have adapted to thrive with minimal supplemental irrigation once established.

Some of my favorite drought-tolerant selections include Sunset and Coronado Red Hyssop as well as any of the Plant Select Penstemon; Red Rocks, Carolyn's Hope or Pike's Peak. Plant Select introductions like the Chocolate Flower (*berlandiera lyrata*) and Blonde Ambition Blue Grama Grass have proven exceptionally resilient while adding year-round interest to the landscape. These plants not only tolerate dry conditions but also support local wildlife and contribute to a sustainable garden ecosystem.

By incorporating native plants and Plant Select varieties, Colorado gardeners can create colorful, low-maintenance landscapes that require less water and fewer resources. Whether designing a pollinator garden, a xeriscape, or simply looking to reduce water usage, drought-tolerant plants provide reliable performance and lasting beauty. With thoughtful plant selection, it's possible to enjoy a thriving garden that reflects the natural character of Colorado while conserving one of our most precious resources—water.

Quick Garden Mojito
8–10 fresh mojito mint leaves
1–2 tsp sugar (or simple syrup)
Juice of ½ a lime
1.5 oz white rum
Club soda

Muddle the mint, sugar, and lime juice in a glass. Add ice, pour in the rum, and top with club soda.

Give it a gentle stir and garnish with a fresh sprig of mint.

Bonus tip: Try adding a little basil for a fun twist.

As the heat of summer approaches, keep your plants thriving with a few simple steps: water deeply (especially containers), feed regularly (your petunias will thank you), and don't be afraid to trim and deadhead to keep the blooms coming strong.
